



Today few sites remain, but the story of this extraordinary episode in Imperial history is as vivid as ever – the initial uprising by the seepoys at Meerut on 10 May 1857, the feverish battles in Old Delhi, the betrayal and massacre of women and children at Cawnpore (Kanpur), the heroic defence of Lucknow and the romantic life and death of the Rani of Jhansi. After the final surrender on 20 June 1858, the British ended both the East India Company and the Mughal Empire, sending the deposed Emperor Bahadur Shah to exile in Burma. With the coming of the British Raj, India was ruled by a British governor

The Delfin riverboat operates out of Iquitos in the Peruvian Amazon. This classic 65-foot Amazon riverboat with its wood-panelled décor was built in 1986 and given a major refurbishment in 2006. There is a covered observation deck and extensive library of books on the Amazon. Two eight-seater excursion boats equipped with life jackets, rain ponchos, rubber boots, torches and fishing canes are available throughout the trip. Visit the Pacaya Samiria Reserve, the largest and most pristine flooded forest in the world, walk through native villages and learn about life in the rainforest from the all-Peruvian crew of 15 who are fluent in English and rainforest-savvy.

The ultimate way to explore the Keralan backwaters is on the 65-foot Discovery 1 - the only 'boutique' boat on the backwaters. Whilst retaining the traditional feel of a typical Keralan rice barge, it is narrow enough to travel up and down the myriad canals and waterways. The large sitting area on deck is half covered – ideal for eating or reading in the shade – with the other half perfect for sunbathing and bird-watching. Discovery 1 has been impeccably decorated and is leagues ahead of other barges in the backwaters. Catering is to the highest standard. Two to three nights are recommended to gain a 'true' backwater experience and get away from the day cruises in the area.

The Charaidew cruises on the River Brahmaputra in Assam and is now joined on the river by her near-identical sister ship **Sukapha**. In summer Sukapha will run on the River Hugli between Kolkata and the Ganges.

Wildlife and wilderness are the main features of a Brahmaputra cruise – the river bed is often 20 or 30km across, an empty world of sand spits and water with marvellous birdlife and the occasional Gangetic Dolphin. The cruises here also give access to a number of India's national parks, including Kaziranga, perhaps the finest of all, and Manas, a Project Tiger Reserve on the **Bhutan** border. Explore the area and its wildlife by jeep or on the back of an elephant, take a village walk, visit tea gardens, explore country towns in cycle rickshaws, enjoy a barbecue on a deserted river island, a dance performance, and visits to craft workshops.

Sights not to be missed from the River Hugli include temples, towns and villages, which you can explore by bus, cycle rickshaw or on foot. On this more intimate waterway the emphasis is on monuments and culture - Hindu, Muslim and colonial.

# Fiona's trip report:

As we drove up into the rolling green hills of the Sierras Chicas, the sandy track, flanked by pampas grass, dipped and rose, crossing tumbling streams until we reached Los Potreros. Its shady lawn gave way to an L-shaped whitewashed homestead and an inviting verandah where three snoozing labradors set the scene for the relaxed atmosphere of the days to come.

Los Potreros is special. It is owned and run by the Begg family, fourth-generation Anglo

Service is impeccable, the state-rooms are comfortable and roomy, and there are promenade decks and a large observation deck above. Become entranced by the great panoramas and waterworlds as they unfold about you and explore the shore with local guides.


Evenings kicked off with an informal wine-tasting in the sitting room or sundowners on the verandah, followed by a candle-lit dinner. Lunch was generally outside - often traditional asado or barbecue with great hunks of melt-in-the-mouth beef or marinaded chicken cooked on an open fire.

On our first day we rode down through a picturesque gorge, tethering our horses and climbing down a steep ravine to a stunning cascading waterfall where we swam in the cool waters, the falls pummelling our shoulders in a unique massage. On our second day we swapped the gentle exertions of the trail for the thrill of the polo field. After 15 minutes of stick and ball we were deemed ready to commence this 'sport of kings' and enjoyed a thrilling few chukkas before turning for home, a glass of wine and a delicious

lunch. The following day we packed our saddlebags and headed off for a three-day trail ride.

Our days on the trail passed in a glorious succession of picturesque valleys, tumbling streams, forests of silver birch and eucalyptus, rocky hillsides strewn with pink granite and wild flowers and condors wheeling above. Picnic lunches of cheese, bread and tomatoes bursting with flavour preceded our overnight stays. The first was in a basic lodge with bunk beds, no hot water but a delightful family who spoke no English. The second was in a gorgeous stone cottage set in its own valley, with a traditional range for cooking and candles for light. After tea and scones, a hot shower and a welcome glass of wine, we settled down to a tasty supper. Returning to the estancia for the last couple of nights, I resumed my early morning walks on the farm and enjoyed bird-watching and studying the beautiful meadow flowers.

I would recommend a minimum of five nights at Los Potreros which can be combined with a couple of nights in **Buenos Aires**. Prices start from £1730 per person for 11 days.

#### China to Tibet

The new Beijing to Lhasa Railway is the highest in the world, climbing from an altitude of 2,829 metres at Golmut to 3,650 metres at Lhasa, much of it built on permafrost. Its highest point is just over 5,000m at the Tanggula Pass. All cabins are pressurised and air-conditioned and, because of the altitude, oxygen is also available. The two-night train journey is best combined with an overland journey across the Tibetan Plateau to take in the country's stunning picturesque scenery of rural villages and snow-capped mountains.

#### Machu Picchu, Peru

Purchased in Singapore, the Hiram Bingham's carriages have been luxuriously refurbished in Peru. #### Bhutan's king to abdicate

The remote Himalayan Kingdom of Bhutan, also known as the Land of the Thunder Dragon, receives around 12,000 visitors a year. King Jigme Singye Wangchuck has announced that he will abdicate in 2008, when the country is due to hold elections for the first time.

The King took the throne in 1972 at the age of 17 and next year the monarchy will be 100 years old. However, its absolute power in the largely Buddhist nation of almost 600,000 people will be curtailed as the country moves to adopt a constitution and elect its first prime minister in 2008, making 2007/8 a good time to visit.

Over the years King Jigme Singye Wangchuck, who has four wives and lives in a log cabin on the edge of the capital, has opened up the country to limited tourism. Bhutan has strict environmental and logging laws that have preserved the majority of its woodlands and mountain climbing is banned in order to protect its more remote regions.


