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
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



More than one hundred saffron-robed monks, strolling serenely down the road in the early dawn silently taking alms from the local people, will be an enduring memory of my magical visit to Laos, Vietnam and Cambodia.

With its magnificent gold leaf and mosaic temples, elegant French colonial buildings, busy night markets and gentle pace, my days in Laos were filled with a colourful cross-section of life. Everywhere you are met by the friendly Lao greeting "Sayabadea" - with the palms pressed together and an open smile. Lao cuisine is an important part of any trip to the country and the visitor is spoilt for choice - delicious spicy curries and flavoursome soups, stuffed bamboo, sticky rice, deep-fried shrimps and fresh mango salads.

All too soon, my sojourn in this simple but charming country was over and a short flight brought me to Hanoi, capital of Vietnam. The uniformed officials at the international airport seemed to promise a sterner atmosphere than the warmth of our Lao friends, but it wasn't long before Hanoi began to work its charms. I soon found myself on an exhilarating 'cyclo' (rickshaw) ride through the narrow streets of the ancient quarter where pavement sellers and old ladies wearing traditional bamboo cone-shaped hats and fruit baskets slung from yokes jostled for position among overflowing kite stalls and speeding mopeds. The mustard-yellow French architecture of the grand Presidential Palace was a striking contrast to Ho Chi Minh's simple cottage in the grounds. Even the unsmiling guards in Ho Chi Minh's mausoleum cast a spell on our line as we filed into the dark chill interior of his tomb.

Over the days that followed I had many more wonderful experiences, including a memorable day spent on a Chinese fishing junk in Halong Bay, where limestone outcrops provide a glorious backdrop for a feast of fresh king prawns, stuffed crabs and stir-fried calamari, washed down with icy cold Halida, the local beer.

The luxurious overnight Victoria Express train with






# **SEVILLE**

» what to see « Seville's immense cathedral is one of the biggest in the world and its adjoining 12th Century tower, La Giralda, was originally the mosque's minaret. Other major landmarks include the Torre de Oro on the banks of the River Guadalquivir, the Alcázar (fortress) from the Muslim-era which dates from AD 913, the spectacular Plaza de España with its fountains and mini-canals and the Plaza de Toros de la Real Maestranza - the city's bull ring.









its mahogany and brass interior was a very comfortable way to arrive in Sapa, a former French hill station in the rugged mountains of northern Vietnam. In the grip of a tremendous thunderstorm, we set out on foot to explore some of the numerous ethnic settlements which scatter the countryside and ended in the colourful night market, packed with unusual embroideries and tasty food stalls.

Central Vietnam offered still more delights, including the incredible Imperial Tombs of the kings of the last dynasty and the Citadel – an extraordinary complex modelled on Beijing's Forbidden City with moats, lily

ponds, serene temples and walls more than 20 metres thick. My favourite day was in the ancient town of Hoi An, cut off from civilisation by destroyed railway lines and a silted river, untouched by war and frozen in time. There I spent many happy hours strolling past colourful stalls festooned with lanterns and lacquerwork and tailors' shops bursting with beautiful silks, not to mention sitting in one of the many atmospheric restaurants to watch the world go by. Particularly memorable was the morning biking through the lush green Hoi An countryside with its water buffaloes, fish farms, rice being harvested in the paddies, the brilliant blue flash of a kingfisher, ducklings paddling down to the lagoon and an everchanging view of the locals in their houses, simply getting on with daily life.

From there it was just a short air-hop to **Ho Chi Minh City** in the south of the country. Here I visited the extraordinary **Cu Chi** tunnels – an underground rabbit-warren of narrow tunnels, opening into meeting rooms, hospitals and smokeless kitchens where the Vietcong lived a hard but long undetected life during the Vietnam War.

My journey would not have been complete without visiting Cambodia. Phnom Penh, its attractive capital, was full of surprises – from the silver tiled floor of the main pagoda in the City Palace to the

vibrant riverfront cafes and elegant hotels. Without a doubt though, the prize for the most amazing day of sightseeing goes to the magnificent temples at **Angkor**. In temperatures of up to 35 degrees centigrade we scaled extensive terraces marvelling at the delicate bas-relief carvings depicting the minutiae of life some 900 years ago, clambering through doorway after doorway into courtyards where the grasping roots of banyan trees coiled themselves like sleeping snakes over broken pillars and leaning arches. The grand finale was a steep climb up 40 or 50 or so near-vertical steps to look out over the vast complex of **Angkor Wat** and beyond to the Cambodian jungle topped by the setting sun.

It was my last day and I'd go back tomorrow like a shot.

# **VIETNAM**

Cruise around Hanoi's ancient quarter in a cyclo – a unique way to experience the city's hustle and bustle. Your base could be Hanoi's classic and stylish Metropole Hotel, built in 1901 with elegant woodpanelled interiors, historic rooms and a glorious pool in the heart of the city.

Take the romantic Victoria Express overnight train and visit the former French colonial hill station of Sapa near the Chinese border where you can trek through picturesque hill villages and meet village people. Situated at 1,600m, its cool climate inspired the French to build villas there as a summer retreat. Explore the World Heritage Site of Halong Bay from your own private Chinese sailing junk, dropping anchor in one of the many tranquil bays. Enjoy a magical night on board in this seascape of limestone islands and next day take a kayak out for an adventure on the emerald waters.

Float down the **Perfume River** and visit the **Imperial City** with its tombs, pagodas and temples and stay in the grandiose 1920s art-deco **Hotel La Residence and Spa** which was built on the banks of the river for the French Governor. A swim in the floodlit pool with its nightly chorus of frogs is something to remember.

Experience Hoi An's bustling market streets and order silk suits – hand-tailored in a day – then retreat back to the tranquility of the Life Resort with its gorgeous gardens filled with trailing orchids and frangipani. Sit on the edge of the infinity pool and watch the sampans on the river just a stone's throw away or relax with a massage in the spa.

Relax on the tropical white sandy beaches or explore some of the small outlying islands at **Nha Trang** in **Southern Vietnam** from the stunning **Evason Hideaway Villas**. Winner of Tatler's 'Hotel of the Year' in 2005, the resort is accessible only by sea and feels like a private island. Its 53 villas are peaceful, open-sided and dotted around a glorious beach on the remote **Ninh Van Bay**. It is a luxurious world where everything is crafted from local woods and hot bowls of 'Pho' are delivered by hand-drawn wooden boat.

Visit Saigon's extraordinary Cu Chi tunnels – an incredible network of underground rooms, tunnels and hideaways hand dug by Vietnamese resistance fighters. You could stay in the sumptuous grandeur of the five-star Park Hyatt in the heart of the city which is just a short walk to the central market.

# CAMPODIA

Explore the extraordinary temples at Angkor, notably Ta Prohm which is known as the Kingdom of Trees because of the way in which the roots of the giant fig, Bayon and kapok trees have wormed their way all over the buildings, reclaiming it for the jungle. Allow several days as there is so much to see.

We suggest a night or two at La Residence d'Angkor with its superb teak and brass décor and sumptuous rooms set around a fragrant tropical garden dotted with fountains and lotus ponds. Soak in an enormous corner bath or slide back the rattan Japanese-style doors to your balcony — a perfect way to end a busy day of sightseeing.







#### **LAOS**

Witness the early morning giving of alms in Luang Prabang – a swaying column of orange robed monks, all carrying a simple bowl to accept your gift of sticky rice, sweets or cakes. Make your base the Hotel La Residence Phou Vao, an Orient Express property with traditional wooden décor, grey stone baths, slatted windows and an atmosphere of time gone by. At sundown, the lush gardens and pool are lit with tiny scented lamps. Relax in the steam room and then plunge into the infinity pool to cool off with the sounds of Luang Prabang and a chorus of cicadas as a backdrop.

This trek passes through a diverse range of climate, vegetation and cultures from lush rain and temperate forest to terraced rice fields. The land and its people change daily, giving trekkers a tantalizing introduction to Nepal's natural and cultural beauty.

The local milieu and food all add something extra to your knowledge of the country and the people so you don't forget it afterwards.

We still have some blind spots on our tulip map in Central Asia, like Turkmenistan, Iran and Georgia/Kaukasus. We have to look into our calendar and finances to see how we can plan our tulip season next year. All the best and thanks for an unforgettable tour!"

» what to see « Founded in 1703 by Peter the Great, St Petersburg has an unparalleled collection of palaces and art treasures illustrating the excesses of the Russian court in the 18th and 19th centuries. Your visit would include the Peter and Paul Fortress, once a prison and now the burial place of the Tsars, the breathtaking St Isaac's Cathedral with its majestic malachite columns and vast painted dome and the Russian Museum full of the country's finest art. A 45-minute drive outside the city brings you to the magnificent palace and parks at Peterhof. Situated on the Gulf of Finland, this is the oldest accessible royal estate where, in summer, 144 fountains create a spellbinding display. One of the main highlights is The Hermitage. Built in the 1660s as part of the Winter Palace to house the private art treasures of Catherine the Great, this magnificent building houses over two million exhibits. No visit to St Petersburg is complete without Yussipov Palace with its exquisite miniature theatre and the gilded Rastrelli masterpiece of Catherine's Palace at Tsarskoye Selo.

In Moscow see the mysterious territory of the yellow-walled Kremlin, home not only to unexpected treasures but also to the Russian Parliament. The Armoury Museum displays an astonishing collection of royal gifts and the priceless regalia of the Tsars and Tsarinas. Continue on foot to Red Square and past the goose-stepping guards into Lenin's tomb before admiring the colourful onion-domes of St Basil's Cathedral.

» for those staying longer « We recommend extending your trip to include the Golden Ring, a name given to the ancient cities lying to the northeast of Moscow. Although far from circular, it is, by virtue of its ancient monuments, kremlins and the wealth of folk art, golden. Many buildings date from the 12th Century and a journey between each town provides a glimpse of the simple rural life of Russia. Due to generally poor accommodation, the area is usually visited by taking one of the many boat cruises between Moscow and St Petersburg, however inevitably such trips provide limited access to the region. With a number of new, small private hotels being built, the Golden Ring is set to become the exciting new destination within Russia.

A complete tour of the Golden Ring can take up to two weeks but for those guests travelling to Russia for the first time we would suggest a two-day extension from Moscow visiting two of the most beautiful towns – **Suzdal** and **Vladimir**.
