

Whatever your plans, we recommend you stay in one of Morocco's many stylish 'riads', or traditional houses. The word riad derives from the Arabic 'ryad', describing a house or palace with an interior garden. The inward focus of the dwelling with its central garden and lack of large windows on the exterior clay or mud brick walls allowed for family privacy and protection from the weather. Although the style of riads has changed over the years, the basic form is still the same and many renovated riads have been transformed into restaurants or boutique places to stay, providing a peaceful break from the hustle and bustle outside. We have a number of favourites that we would like to share with you.



ESSAOUIRA

Dar Mimosa offers superb accommodation set in an extraordinary garden. Built and run by its French owner, who is often to be found cooking guest's dinners, this magical little hotel offers just four two-roomed villas with private gardens, and four double bedrooms, so there are never more than 24 guests at any one time. The décor is memorable from its striking blue and white tiled bathrooms to its ochre and blue walls, traditional furniture and antique paintings. Lunch may be taken around the mosaic tiled pool while dinners are served in one of the many private salons dotted throughout the main house or in your private villa. Essaouira's busy port is a mere 2 km away.





MARRAKECH

Dar Les Cigognes, meaning 'house of storks, stands opposite the gates of the Royal Palace. A former merchant's home, it has been recreated by renowned architect Charles Boccara into an oasis of luxury and calm. Each of the 11 bedrooms and en suite bathrooms is different and draws on the rich cultural heritage of Moorish art and décor. An attractive courtyard with fruit trees and a fountain provides a peaceful place for relaxation.

Riad Noga is just ten minutes' walk from the main square, tucked away down a side street in the heart of the old medina. It offers seven richly decorated double rooms with en suite bathrooms situated around a central courtyard with tumbling bougainvillea and orange trees. The dining room has a vaulted ceiling and there is a panoramic view from the roof terrace. The green tiled swimming pool is solar-heated and there are plenty of private terraces for reading or sunbathing.

orocco is the perfect destination for a long weekend, a self-drive boliday, a coastal break, a desert experience or a revitalizing trek.



ATLAS MOUNTAINS

The Kasbah du Toubkal is situated at 1800 metres at the foot of Jbel Toubkal, the highest peak in North Africa. It offers true Berber hospitality in a variety of rooms including the spectacular Garden Suite with its 12 metre glass wall looking up to Jbel Toubkal. There are also Berber Salons with gallery sleeping areas for families and small groups. Although only an hour's drive from Marrakech, the peace and seclusion are so complete that the city seems a million miles away. Explore the village, nearby hamlets and the surrounding mountain landscape, on foot or by mule, or just relax on the terrace or in the hammam (steam bath).




FEZ

La Maison Bleue was built in 1915 and has 12 rooms and suites and a delightful roof terrace situated just a few minutes' walk from the busy souks of Fez. The rooms are packed with exquisite antiques and have mosaic tiled floors, chandeliers, luxurious curtains, brocaded sofas and four-poster beds. Dinner is a memorable four-course extravaganza with musicians, candlelight and fountains! The rooms have some modern luxuries — television, hairdryer and mini bar, but otherwise are delightfully old-fashioned.





RIDING in Rajasthan



Last year, Julia Loxton and her sister Diana Fisher enjoyed one of our personalised riding itineraries in India, joining a small group. We flew to **Delhi** and spent a couple of days there visiting wonderful sights, including the old town, **Qutb Minar, Purana Quila** and the **Lodhi Gardens** – there are so many fascinating places to visit, it's a good idea to do plenty of background reading so you can pinpoint where to go.

Our next stop was **Agra** and the **Taj Mahal**, which I was pretty ambivalent about visiting. I thought I'd seen so many photos of it, there was no need to go in person. I was so wrong! It's simply the most beautiful building I've ever seen, and no photographs do it justice. It's a must see, and I'm so grateful to Fiona for stressing we should go.

We spent a lovely night at the Laxmi Vilas Palace at Bharatpur, visiting the nature reserve early the following morning with a young, knowledgeable and enthusiastic guide, where we saw (among many



Vamizi Island

Vamizi Island in the Quirimbas Archipelago off the coast of northern Mozambique is part of the Maluane conservation area, one of the last pristine marine wilderness areas left in the world. The aim is to keep it that way through a combination of scientifically-based conservation projects and sustainable, low impact tourism.

Vamizi Island Lodge was the first lodge to open as part of the Maluane project. One of Maluane's co-founders, Dr Julia Garnier, is a renowned wildlife vet who worked with the London Zoological Society and the local communities to develop projects including turtle conservation, coral and fish

inventories and monitoring, wildlife surveys, community education and training of Mozambican students in conservation management.

other creatures) a large python coiled at the side of the track, probably waiting for us all to move away so it could cross!

The **Pushkar Camel Fair** was one of the highlights of our trip, and it was such fun – as we neared the town more and more trucks and buses were heading there, often filled with Rajasthani girls in their gloriously vivid clothes and wonderful jewellery, all looking so excited and waving to us as we passed.

Camels, horses and cattle filled the hillsides at the edge of the town as far as the eye could see, and it looked like a scene from the Bible. The camels were decorated with geometric designs on their coats, some clipped on and some painted, and many had embroidered mirror-work cloths under their saddles. There were huge camels, baby camels, led, tethered, ridden, pulling carts, or lying down fast asleep – we just wandered, taking endless photographs, and scarcely able to believe what we were seeing!

In the town, people thronged through the streets, past stalls selling food of all descriptions, camel and horse saddlery, wonderful embroidered and mirror-worked bags and hangings — which I remembered from the 1960's and the hippie era, and never knew it all hailed from Rajasthan! In the middle of it all a big wheel

turned slowly and majestically, and at the lake in the centre of Pushkar, Di and I had a Hindu blessing.

We saw one party of riders arrive at the fair looking terrified as their horses went absolutely crazy when they approached all the noise, and, as we realised later, the safari horses are all stallions and there were a lot of mares tethered nearby. Di and I gave each other a very apprehensive look, and both of us turned ashen with terror!

The next day we met the owner and operator of the horse safari and his horses, which were small, fit and contentedly munching their feed whilst tethered at the back of our tented camp. Within a couple of minutes of riding them we realised they were a joy — willing, comfortable and totally bombproof, even when lorries tore past with horns blaring inches from us. Many unflattering comparisons were made to our own horses at home!


The riding was wonderful, through timeless villages with smiling, waving inhabitants, across semi desert, where once we saw an old man shepherding a herd of camel ahead of us, across fields, walking and cantering fast on our agile and sure-footed horses.

We stopped for lunch each day, sometimes in a farmyard, other times in a field, by a temple, or at

the side of a lake where the fishing nets were being pulled in by teams of boys, and goats were being tended by a woman and her young son. We were always found shade under a tree, a delicious freshly-cooked lunch was waiting, with bowls of hot soup to start with, and beer, lemonade or water to drink. The horses were whisked away from us to be watered, fed, groomed and rested while we ate and magically reappeared, saddled and ready when we had finished.

We stayed in different palaces each night, where the kindness and hospitality of our hosts was unfailing. Some of the palaces had been turned into hotels, some were beginning to take guests, and all were vast buildings full of history and atmosphere. It was all such fun, and really well-organised. We left the safari not exhausted and stiff as we'd imagined, but fit as fleas and raring to go — not bad for a couple of fifty-somethings!

We finished our lovely trip at the Lake Palace hotel, Udaipur, in total comfort and luxury with some jewellery shopping thrown in, but no sign of James Bond! Thank you Fiona for organising such a great holiday brilliantly, and I can't wait to go back to India again."

» what to do « Mysore, the charming town immortalised by RK Narayan in his Malgudi novels, provides an excellent base from which to tour South India. The Western Ghats, the coffee plantations of Coorg, the game reserves of the Nilgris and the Ooty hill station are all within a few hours' drive. If you fancy going to the races, Mysore Turf Club has one of the prettiest race tracks in the world —

with its flower beds and backdrop of the Chamundi Hill. When it is not being used for races, the track becomes a nine-hole golf course! If racing doesn't appeal you can learn yoga, take a massage, or buy locally-woven crepe de chine, silk and cotton and get a local tailor to copy your favourite garments.

You would depart on 30 November 2008 from Punte Arenas in Chile with a flight of a little more than three-hours over Cape Horn and the mythical waters of the Drake Passage, to King George Island, the largest island of the South Shetlands. Here at the gates of the 'White Continent' it is a six-day navigation along the Antarctic Peninsular visiting the most wonderful wildlife sites and enjoying superb lectures en route.

MY Sarsen was built in 1970 as a North Atlantic survey vessel and equipped with an ice-strengthened hull. She underwent major refurbishment in 1986, and again in 2006 when she was converted into an intimate charter vessel. The winches used for pulling the large fishing nets have been removed and the stern altered to accommodate a landing platform, a small swimming pool and large outdoor dinning area with BBQ facilities. Winter is hard in Mongolia – hard but agonisingly beautiful! Temperatures can fall to - 40°C, making **Ulaanbaatar** the coldest capital in the world. However, the daytime temperature is usually around - 10°C which is perfect for a dog-sledding adventure. It is so invigorating to be in the region's continental climate, where air pressure is high, the sun shines all day and where the nomads are so appreciative of a visitor in the middle of winter!

Dogs have been an integral part of Mongolian nomadic life but it is only recently that dog-sledding has become more widely known. You can combine it with cultural activities or take a trip solely based on dog-sledding. A good time to go is at the time of the festival of the Mongolian Lunar New Year, an important traditional celebration when the nomads don their traditional finery and mark the end of the

harsh winter and the coming of spring. The festival focuses on the unity of the family – and is an opportunity for you to visit local families. Another unmissable event, the unique 'Thousand Camel' festival takes place in the heart of the Gobi Desert just after the new year celebrations, from late January to late February. In addition to the colourful opening ceremony, the spectacle includes camel races and polo matches and performances by traditional musicians and dancers. Established to help preserve the Bactrian camel population, it is a rare opportunity to get close up to these amazing animals when they have all their winter fur, and to gain an insight into the nomadic lifestyle of the camel herder.
