Focus on ORDAN



Jordan offers so much – the rose-red city of **Petra**; the extraordinary **Dead Sea** where you can swim at the lowest point on earth without sinking; the breathtaking Roman amphitheatre at **Jerash** and the majestic citadel which sits atop **Amman** and affords spectacular views of the city below, especially at night – being just a few of them. However, Jordan is not just all about monuments and souqs and there are many special things to see and do outside the main attractions. If, for example, you like to walk – look beyond Petra's dusky-pink façade and take a day to visit the **High Place of Sacrifice**. It's bypassed by many of those who are caught up in the well-trodden tourist path to the Treasury. Peter Wrangham's account of his journey through Jordan will give you a colourful flavour of the country. Peter is a keen birder who took time out to visit a couple of reserves and very much enjoyed the experience.

anuary is an ideal month to think about planning a visit to Jordan. Spring and autumn are the best times to go and there are sights and activities to cater for all interests.

PETRA – THE HIGH PLACE

Although Petra is best known for its grand façades carved into the rock face such as the **Treasury** and the **Monastery**, the extraordinary mountain-top **High Place of Sacrifice** is worth the puff to reach – for the views and sense of history as well as the sense of achievement.

All around Petra, on several summits ringing the ancient city, so-called 'high places' survive – exposed mountain-top sanctuaries built by Petra's Nabataean people to worship their gods. Many are difficult, or even dangerous, to reach. The 'High Place', though, is neither; even if you have only one day in Petra, it's worth the climb – and takes 30 or 40 minutes with safe steps at all the tricky points.

Steps near Petra's ancient theatre divert off the main path, leading up into a gully on a circuitous route up the mountain-side. This was a processional way for Nabatean priests and followers and in some parts you climb steps carved into the rock by masons 2000 years ago. The 360-degree view when you emerge onto the hand-levelled platform at the summit is unparalleled and stretches right across Petra's vast landscape.

This is where religious ceremonies were held – there is a rock-cut altar to one side, with a carved basin (probably for catching blood). What exactly took place up here is uncertain, but animal sacrifice is pretty certain, and possibly even human sacrifice too. Historians have suggested that the Nabataeans may have practised ritual exposure of the dead on these 'high places'. It is an extraordinarily peaceful and spiritual setting in which to linger in the cool breeze and imagine looking down on an ancient procession of colourful priests with their musical instruments and incense, and animals bearing the wood to burn the offering.


Trip report:

On one of his holidays with us **Peter Wrangham** took our ten-day **Ancient Kingdom of Jordan** trip. Here we highlight just one day of his journey in this excerpt from his diary.

25 February. We left the hotel at 7.30am for Petra. The entrance gate is a kilometre from the start of the Siq. The Siq is a gully of about 400 metres through rugged stratified rock and the sides rise on both sides to as high as 100 metres and vary in width from about three metres to seven metres. At peak times of the year with horse drawn carriages (which Philip, our guide, called chariots), donkeys carrying the overweight and so many people, I can imagine the crowd becomes quite congested.

Suddenly, we see our first view of the Treasury ahead through the narrow slit of the Siq. Apart from being the best known building in Petra it is really dramatic. The full effect of its grandeur is felt as you clear the Siq. The morning sunshine makes the façade very dramatic with its detailed carving. The Treasury is a misnomer as the legend was that *pirate treasures were stored behind the façade, however none have ever been found.*

After seeing all we wanted we went on down a gentle decline in the valley which opened out before us. We wandered around a Roman amphitheatre, which is said to have held 3000 people. Then we picked up our donkeys to take us to the Monastery up 800 steps. The saddles have a metal hold on the front to help riders. This experience saved us time and energy in the heat and was rather fun except my beast rubbed my knee hard against a rock! The Monastery is yet another dramatic façade on multi-coloured rock, which was built in 300 AD. We lunched in the shade of a juniper tree then back down on foot seeing great views as we descended the 800 steps. Finally the long walk back to the entrance passing the Treasury in quite different light – a long and exhausting day, but a real pinnacle of our trip.





ere are some top travel tips for my ten favourite destinations. Why not plan a trip to one or more of them this year? We can tailor an itinerary that will be special for you.

1. MONGOLIA

One of Asia's last unspoilt travel destinations, **Mongolia's** endless horizons and simple nomadic lifestyle will make you feel you have travelled to the end of the earth!

» Tip « Enter Mongolia by train from Russia or China and immerse yourself slowly into a lifestyle which goes back centuries.

2. VIETNAM

Our comprehensive trans-Vietnam programme offers an exhilarating journey from the mountain highlands of Sapa in the north to the Mekong Delta in the south. From Hanoi, head up to the hill station of Sapa (1650m) which enjoys the coolest climate in Vietnam. After returning by train, drive to Halong Bay with its 3000 spectacular limestone rock formations and enjoy a night on a traditional Chinese-style sailing junk, visiting the nearby caves and grottoes by boat or kayak. Journey on to the old imperial capital of Hue and a cruise on the Perfume River; then Saigon, a vibrant city of elegant hotels, roadside noodle stalls, exclusive restaurants, street children and noisy 'cyclo' drivers. Journey's end is Vietnam's 'rice-bowl' - the Mekong Delta, a rich, fertile region of flat farmland interlaced with thousands of waterways and tributaries of the mighty Mekong.

» Tip « Prepare yourself for quite a few internal flights. We normally try to avoid this, but it's a good way to cover this geographically very long country and its incredibly diverse sights in a relatively short space of time.

3. PERU

A country of extraordinary diversity, superb archaeological sights, beautiful landscapes and abundant wildlife, **Peru** not only offers amazing treasures, but lovely places to stay. There are a number of superb small boutique hotels and lodges coming up which we can incorporate into your holiday.

» Tip « I have several! Make sure you visit the Enrico Poli private museum in Lima – home to a mesmerizing collection of some of the most outstanding relics of ancient Peruvian cultures. Even if you don't want to trek the whole Inca trail, you can still leave the Cusco to Machu





Picchu train at the KM104 marker where our private guides will take you on an unforgettable day-long trek culminating at Machu Picchu – arriving the way the Incas used to come. Stay at the lodge right by Machu Picchu. Getting up at dawn the next morning, with only a few steps to the entrance, you will have virtually the whole site to yourself.

4. RUSSIA

A far cry from how we used to imagine dull-grey life behind the iron curtain: **Russia** offers **St Petersburg's** magnificent palaces and art museums, **Moscow's** symbolic **Red Square** and yellow-walled **Kremlin**, the chance to take an extraordinary journey across the **Siberian Tundra** by train, the far-off ports on the eastern seaboard, and interaction with the country's extraordinarily tough and patriotic people.

» Tip « Go in winter with the chance of snow on the ground. It's cold enough to freeze the end of your nose but the queues for palaces and monuments are much shorter and the image of golden domes against a snowy backdrop will be etched forever on your memory. While in the cities, take one of our marvellous English-speaking Russian guides – they are so good, we feel bound to give them a special mention.



Tibet offers some of the most magnificent scenery on earth. Peaceful and hospitable inhabitants and an unusual remoteness make this country quite unique.

» Tip « Don't just visit Tibet. Allow time to explore **Nepal** and **Bhutan** too. All three countries are vastly different and we strongly recommend that you travel overland through Tibet and Bhutan to really grasp the contrasts in their personalities.

6. INDIA

A few years ago now I spent over four months crisscrossing India from north to south and west to east on a colourful journey which took in the barren moonscapes of Ladakh, the mystical foothills of the Himalayas, Rajasthan's colourful heritage, the colonial hills stations of Shimla and Darjeeling, the heat of dust of Kolkata and the tranquil tropical





south. I loved India then for its sheer diversity and much later for providing me with a charming, handsome and well-read husband!

» Tip « One of our great strengths is our inside track into a huge variety of beautiful boutique hotels and unique heritage palaces in rural towns and villages. We will usually incorporate at least a few into your itinerary. As almost all are owner-run, they will provide you with a unique insight into the lives of Indian nobility of a bygone era.

7. OMAN

Oman reveals many hidden surprises given that its neighbour Dubai is known for its huge-scale construction and mass-market tourism. Here could not be more different – true wilderness in the craggy coastal northern Mussandam Peninsular and desert in Thesiger's Empty Quarter in the south. You will love the variety of Oman's unspoilt coastline, mountains, palmfringed wadis and the imposing restored fortresses of the interior.



» Tip « Make sure you are in Nizwa on a Friday morning and take yourself back centuries by visiting the ancient cattle market where traders still come together for this important weekly event.

8. BHUTAN

The remote and mystical kingdom of **Druk Yul**, Land of the Thunder Dragon, lies virtually forgotten, sandwiched between India and Tibet in the very heart of the **Himalayas**. Just one surfaced road crosses the country from west to east. Along it unfolds a tale of extraordinarily diverse scenery, peoples and their customs. Landlocked, and still with relatively limited communications, much of its magic and charm lingers despite the arrival of the 21st century. We urge you to visit while this delightful kingdom retains its unique heritage. **Bhutan** is one of the last 'untouched' cultures in the world – mainly because visit numbers are strictly controlled.

» Tip « If you have time, traverse the country from west to east. You will be

astonished by the diversity of the landscape – from snow-capped mountains and ancient forests in the west to tropical jungle in the east.

9. CENTRAL ASIA


Little-known and even less visited, the countries along the **Great Silk Route** provide spectacular surprises for the traveller willing to explore. Discover the fabled **Khanate of Khiva** and the dazzling monuments of **Bukhara** and **Samarkand** before heading east to cross the windswept steppe of the **Tien Shan Mountains** in **Kyrgyzstan**. The **Pamir Mountains** of **Tajikistan** have an allure of their own for those who enjoy true wilderness. It's a hard place to travel but you really will enjoy a holiday experience unlike any other.

» Tip « Allow an extra day in Bukhara where you can sit in the cafes of the Lyab-I-Hauz and watch old men with long beards and gnarled hands playing chess, drinking coffee and debating life. You will be transported back in time.

10. MOROCCO

An outstandingly diverse country which evokes the romanticsm of the camel caravan and the bustling souk. Only a three and a half hour flight from the UK yet after an evening wandering the labyrinth of souks, or a day out in the dramatic jagged peaked landscape of the **Atlas Mountains** you will feel a world away.

» Tip « If you can, we suggest you self-drive. Once outside the cities, the roads are relatively empty and you will find it easy to move from A to B. Relaxing with your own car means there are no time constraints and you can really pace the trip to suit yourself.



UPPER BRAHMAPUTRA – SPECIAL EXPLORATORY CRUISE

» 10-22 April « This is an opportunity to join a special 12-night exploratory cruise on the Brahmaputra River in Assam in April. The regular Brahmaputra cruises travel upstream as far as Neamati, around 400 miles east of the Bangladesh frontier, the highest point where there is sufficient depth of water all year. In April, with the first of the snow melt coming down from the Himalayas, the aim is to go 125 further upriver to Guijan, which is 90 miles from Tibet to the north and 40 miles from Burma to the south.

The itinerary cannot be completely firm but it should include the **Dibru Saikhowa National Park**, a littleknown reserve with excellent birding and the chance, if you are very lucky, to see tiger and leopard. In addition to visiting the archaeological site of **Deopahar**, a hilltop temple dating from the 11th century, side-trips may include the coal mines at **Tipong** with their working steam locomotives; **Digboi**, with its war cemetery and world's oldest working oilfield; a bamboo mask-making workshop on **Majuli Island**, and the pyramidal burial mounds of the Ahom kings at **Charaidew**.
