Everyone agrees on how exhilarating it is to explore by dog sledge, standing on the runners whilst the dogs take the strain. Snow and weather conditions permitting, you will make daily trips through beautiful snowscape. After a day on the trail relax around a log fire. Your hosts have a fund of stories about life in the north. They are excellent cooks and their menus feature locally caught reindeer, elk and salmon. There's usually the chance to enjoy a sauna or hot tub before you fly home.

This dog-sledging expedition takes us along the King's Way from the dramatic high peaks and rock faces of Norway to the vast open plateaux and lakes of Sweden. There will be opportunities for dog-sledging along frozen rivers and lakes and exploration of the varied countryside around Kiruna. The expedition ends near Jukkasjarvi where the famous Ice Hotel is located. Made using ice from the Torne River, it is the largest igloo in the world and features ice sculptures, a cinema and the Absolut Ice Bar carved entirely from ice. ARCTIC NORWAY AND SPITSBERGEN

Early spring when the days are rapidly lengthening is a beautiful time of year in the Arctic and travelling by dog-sledge is to experience its true spirit. These expeditions in the mountains and high plateaux of **Northern Norway** have been organised and led by our Norwegian friends for many years. We can arrange short trips and extensions such as a visit by skidoo to the **Sami** (Lapp) people in their summer or winter camps, to **Summer Island** or the picturesque **Lofoten Islands** or a day visit to **Tromsø** and its **Polar Museum** and **Northern Lights Planetarium**. For all trips you will drive your own dog team.

Enjoy delicious meals and return home with the knowledge of the special relationship between a man and his dog in the Arctic.

Isfjord Radio

Situated about 90km west of Longyearbyen, the remote Isfjord Radio station was, until a few years ago, an important telecommunications link between the Norwegian mainland and the inhabitants of Svalbard. Tastefully renovated, it now operates as a wilderness station with modern comforts and has 23 rooms with 49 beds in four buildings with shared facilities. The dining room has breathtaking views over Isfjorden towards Greenland.

This is for those wanting to experience a long dog sledging expedition into the true Arctic land, but not to sleep in a tent! The expedition starts from Longyearbyen, continuing northwards to Tempelfjorden and to the unique Basecamp ship in the ice. Spend the night on the 100 year-old schooner before continuing deeper into the north towards Nordenskiöld Glacier and Basecamp Nordenskiöld. This is your base for the next two nights from where you'll make dog sledging forays over sharp mountains, shiny glaciers and frozen fjords before returning to Longyearbyen.

Oscar II Land – cross-country skiing

Oscar II Land is one of the most beautiful areas on Spitsbergen, with its black and sharp mountain peaks that rise up through white glaciers, surrounded by the blue sea. In the midst of all this lies Trollheimen – home of the Trolls.

We arrive by boat from Longyearbyen and don our skis right on the beach. The winter conditions in the Svalbard Archipelago in May are still fantastic - the temperature seldom drops below minus five degrees Celsius (23°F) and the sun won't set for another three months! The entire 80km route is on glaciers, and we haul our equipment on sleds. Nights are spent in warm sleeping bags inside our expedition tents.

This is a challenging expedition with five days of skiing and four nights in a tent. You may experience all kinds of weathers, from snowstorm to sunshine.

The dog team is made up of Greenland dogs thought to be directly descended from huskies brought there by the first Inuit settlers.



It is a lively, healthy pack comprising some 100 dogs, with 10 to 15 puppies being born each year - a joy both for their families and our visitors. The sledding is superb with varied valleys and the High Arctic offering perfect conditions for the dogs to show what they can do.

Greenland remains a popular destination for our expeditions. If you are joining a ship in Iceland, it is well worth adding a few days to your trip pre or post voyage or considering a stand-alone holiday.

Iceland in summer is a land of midnight sun, whilst in winter you may be lucky enough to witness the Aurora Borealis in all its glory. It beckons the visitor with a network of hauntingly scenic routes and many of its natural history sites are well-marked and close to the road. We highly recommend self-drive itineraries by car or four-wheel drive or, for the more cautious, we have various chauffeur-driven options to suggest.

Dog sledging around Liverpool Land with Inuit hunters | 10 days

Leaving the small hunting village of Ittoqqortoormiit (Scoresby Sund) we head due north to explore Liverpool Land where sheer cliffs drop down to meet the sea ice and deep valleys beg to be explored. To the west lies Jameson Land and, to the east, Liverpool Land where it's mostly glaciated land breeding icebergs. We should see countless signs of snow hares, lemmings and polar foxes and we may be lucky enough to see polar bear.

Our guides are local mushers with a wealth of knowledge about the area and how to not just survive the cold but to fully enjoy it. Two nights are spent in a local guest house in Ittoqqortoormiit and the rest in tents or local huts.

Enjoy a two-day dog sledge trip to Kap Heogh on the coast of Liverpool Land as well as snowmobile day trips to Kap Hope and Apuseq Glacier for fantastic views up the north coast. During the two days you spend with local hunters you will observe them checking their seal holes and be on the lookout for polar bear, seals and narwhales.

After a boat trip to Port Victor you'll visit local viewpoints to see the glacier front and, hopefully, calving icebergs. One more challenging walk enables you to get up close to the inland ice.

Experience the High Arctic on board the schooner Hildur. The great fjord system of Scoresby Sund extends 350km inland and is a perfect setting for exploring this remote, fascinating region. The enclosed waters of the sound are calm and many of the fjords have sheer cliffs plunging to depths of more than 3,000 metres. Highlights of this unique voyage include the granite cliffs of Milne Land, trekking the Hjørnedal, scouting for musk oxen, catching Arctic char and hiking with views of the inland ice and old Inuit settlements.

ARCTIC AND FAR EAST RUSSIA

Much of Arctic Russia is tundra dotted with countless lakes and pools through which the vast north-flowing rivers wend their way to the Arctic Ocean. During the short, intense summer these areas are the nesting sites for numerous birds, including the red-breasted goose, Siberian crane and Ross's gull. Wild flowers brighten the ground and musk oxen, bears, reindeer, lynx, wolverine, wolves and foxes roam.

The Kamchatka Peninsula in the Russian Far East is home to the Itelmen, Eveni and Koryaks, some of whom live by their traditional ways of hunting, fishing, reindeer-herding and gathering wild plants. You will feel privileged to be gaining an insight into their very different way of life. Kamchatka is also the home of Russia's largest brown bear. The rivers teem with at least five species of spawning salmon and its rugged coastline accommodates thousands of seabirds as well as seals, sea lions and sea otters. In the valleys plants grow at an incredible rate during the summer due to the volcanically-warmed and minerally-enriched soil.

Dog sledging with the reindeer herders and native people | 15 days

Our route takes us over the pristine snow-covered mountain passes, high plateaux and valleys close to the volcano **Ichinskiy** in central **Kamchatka**. This area is the traditional home of some of the native peoples and we shall stay at an Eveni reindeer herder's winter camp and the wilderness home of a family of Koryak fishermen.

Nights are spent in huts or yurts (large, heated tents). In the village of Esso we will visit the museum, bathe in a hot pool, meet the local people and learn about their culture. If our visit coincides with the 'Beringia' dog sledge race we may be able to watch some of it and meet the competitors.

Dog sledging to Nalycheva Valley | 11 days

This exciting dog sledging expedition will take us to the centre of the Nalychevo National Park which lies to the north of Petropavlovsk. The park is in a magnificent setting surrounded by nine volcanoes, some of them still active. The valley has many fascinating geothermal areas to explore and spectacular scenery. Our nights will be spent in comfortable huts and we shall have plenty of opportunities to enjoy bathing in the hot springs.

Bears, volcanoes, native people, reindeer herders, autumn colours | 18 days

In order to experience the richness of the region's flora, fauna and geology, its scenery and autumn colours, we plan to visit as many habitats as possible including the central valley with the Kamchatka River, Tolbachik, Kzudach, Mutnovsky and Vachkazhets volcanoes, Kurilskoe Lake and the hot Khodukta River in the southern tundra. Kurilskoe Lake, part of a nature reserve, is one of the best places on the peninsula to see brown bears and Steller's sea eagles. Moving around by helicopter and truck we will watch bears feeding on berries and salmon spawning, swim in hot rivers, meet the locals in the settlement of Esso and stay overnight with the nomadic reindeer herders in their summer mountain camp.

TEMPERATURE: We should warn that winter dog sledging expeditions are for the hardy as it can be extremely cold!

BEST TIME TO GO: June to September for summer adventures, January to March for winter activities.

DID YOU KNOW: The Solovetski Islands boast over 170 architectural and archaeological monuments, including 33 mysterious stone labyrinths dating back around 3,000 years.



Solovetski Islands and the White Sea | 12 days

Situated in the White Sea, 150km south of the Arctic Circle, the Solovetski Islands were first settled by monks in the 1430s. The archipelago has six large and nearly 100 smaller islands which abound with lakes, wildflowers and nesting birds and, in summer, beluga whales gather to calve in the shallow waters.

On the largest island, surrounded by enormous stone walls, stands the legendary 16th Century Solovetski Monastery, which in the 20th Century was one of the most feared and infamous prison camps or 'gulags'. Now that the monks have returned, you can visit the beautiful cathedral, church, refectory and other buildings enclosed by the great 'kremlin' or fortification.

In some places, using small boats and wooden rakes, men still collect seaweed to be made into local products. Accommodation here is simple – family-owned comfortable small hotels with delicious food. It's an excellent place for walking in summer.



Several of our voyages are around **Spitsbergen**. Dutch for 'pointed mountains', this is an evocative name for the largest island of the **Svalbard Archipelago** in the High Arctic, 1,300km from the North Pole. It has a fascinating history of Arctic exploration and whaling. The scenery is dramatic – snowy peaks rise majestically through huge ice-caps, glaciers creep down valleys to the sea and sparkling ice walls enclose deep fjords. All this is surrounded by the glistening pack-ice as we walk along rocky shores. Since the banning of hunting in the 1970s, the populations of bears and walruses have dramatically increased and you are almost certain to see these magnificent creatures on your voyage. **East Greenland** is one of the least visited places in the High Arctic since permission to land on

the coast of the National Park is granted to very few operators. Our voyages to East Greenland cover the beautiful fjord system of **Scoresby Sund** and the scenically spectacular south east coast, while **West Greenland** reveals its glorious shores from **Ilulissat** to **Thule**. Since they take place towards the end of the Arctic summer when the ice has receded, the autumn colours should brighten the tundra and there is an excellent possibility of seeing the Northern Lights.

We also sail to the Scottish Islands, Russia, the Canadian Arctic and the High Arctic.

Crossing from **Spitsbergen** we keep watch for fin, humpback and minke whales and approach East Greenland, landing at **Myggebugten**. Moving south to **Scoresby Sund** we land near a glacier and encounter huge icebergs before disembarking finally in **Akureyri** in North Iceland.

We head north along the west coast of Spitsbergen up to Ny Ålesund, the world's most northerly settlement, once a mining village and now a research centre. Depending on weather, we may go ashore on Andøya where common eiders and pink-footed geese nest, and sail into Liefdefjorden, cruising near the 5km long face of the Monaco Glacier. We continue into the Hinlopen Strait, where we will attempt a landing at Nordaustlandet. On to Phippsøya and, pack ice conditions permitting, to Laagøya, a low island where walrus congregate. We'll navigate the ice floes of Lomfjordshalvøya by Zodiacs and explore the bird cliffs and, in Freemansundet, plan to land on Barentsøya to visit an old trapper's hut. Then south to Edgeøya landing on a beach littered with whale bones and tree trunks which have drifted over from Siberia. Our voyage ends in the spectacular Hornsund area. Depending on ice conditions early season voyages may only cover the west side of Spitsbergen.



The Antarctic, particularly the peninsula or 'White Continent' has an incomparable and irresistible beauty - this magical frozen land with its awe-inspiring glaciers and rich diversity of bird and wildlife resonates with the history of intrepid explorers and epic struggles for survival. We offer a range of voyages on icebreakers and expedition ships that is continually changing, so if you cannot find exactly what you want here we will happily make suggestions on places and optional activities to suit your requirements.







Most of our voyages depart from Ushuaia at the southern tip of South America and cross the Drake Passage, spending several days visiting the South Shetland Islands and the Antarctic Peninsula. A few voyages embark in the South Shetland Islands (utilising a flight from Punta Arenas) thereby avoiding the infamous Drake Passage Crossing. The peninsula is a spectacular chain of mountains and glaciers and is the richest part of Antarctica for wildlife. The waters are sheltered by islands which makes for comfortable sailing and easy landings. Some of these voyages also visit South Georgia and the Falkland Islands.

South Georgia is a 100-mile long island with mountains and glaciers that equal the grandeur of Antarctica. There is also a green fringe of vegetation that supports a greater variety of wildlife, including the magnificent king penguin and wandering albatross, many smaller birds such as the endemic pintail and pipit, as well as teaming colonies of fur seals. For those interested in its history, many voyages visit the scene of Shackleton's epic crossing of the island.

The Falkland Islands are different again: An archipelago of large and small islands with an even more varied wildlife and relaxed lifestyle among the human inhabitants.

More adventurous voyages head for the Ross Sea, sometimes called 'The Far Side of Antarctica' - on an icebreaker, to visit emperor penguin colonies and Scott's and Shackleton's huts. Because some of the vessels are comparatively small, early booking is recommended.

They begin in Ushuaia and sail across the Drake Passage directly to the Peninsula providing good chances to see gentoo and adelie penguins and humpback whales. In addition to seeing as much as possible of the peninsula's wildlife and scenery, some voyages also include the South Shetland Islands where you visit the abandoned whaling station on Deception Island. The return voyage is through the Gerlache Strait, home to leopard seals and blue-eyed shags, followed by a visit to a research station. Landings to view wildlife, historic sites and operational bases are usually made twice a day while Zodiac cruises offer an exciting alternative.

On the return trip to Ushuaia, a profusion of seabirds follows the ship.
