

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


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ARCTIC NORWAY Dog-sledging - drive your own dogs

DIVIDALEN, LOFOTEN ISLANDS AND THE SAMI

Early spring is a beautiful time of year in the Arctic and travelling by dog-sledge is to experience its true spirit. These expeditions in the mountains and high plateaux of Northern Norway have been organised and led by our Norwegian friends for over 15 years. We can arrange short trips and extensions such as a visit by skidoo to the Sami (Lapp) people in their summer or winter camps; to Summer Island or to the picturesque Lofoten Islands with their brightly painted cabins set against a backdrop of craggy hills and turquoise waters. A day visit to Tromsø would include the Polar Museum and the Northern Lights Planetarium or 'Polaria'. Do contact us for further information and prices.

Explore Dividalen

Dog-sledding, dog-sledging, dog driving or mushing – there are many ways to describe travelling with a dog team but everyone agrees on how exhilarating it is, standing on the runners of your sledge whilst the dogs take the strain. Snow and weather conditions permitting, you will make daily dog-sledging trips through beautiful snowscape. After a day on the trail you may enjoy a sauna or sit in a hot tub before relaxing around a log fire. Your hosts have a fund of stories about life in the north. They are excellent cooks and their menus feature locally caught reindeer, elk and salmon.

In early spring the days are rapidly lengthening and the rays of the evening sun produce beautiful colours on the snow-covered mountains. At night there is still the possibility of seeing the Aurora Borealis or Northern Lights.

The Kings Way: Crossing Norway into Sweden

This expedition takes us along the **King's Way** from the dramatic high peaks and rock faces of Norway to the vast open plateaux and lakes of Sweden. There will be opportunities to dog-sledge along frozen rivers and lakes and to explore the varied countryside around **Kiruna**.

The expedition ends near Jukkasjarvi, location of the Ice Hotel. Made using ice from the Torne River, it is the largest igloo in the world and features ice sculptures, a cinema and the Absolut Ice Bar carved entirely from ice. We can organise a night there for those who would like to experience this unique accommodation!

Explore the mountains of Arctic Norway

Dividalen is a true wilderness and is incredibly peaceful. This expedition combines extensive exploration of the dramatic scenery of mountains, lakes and high plateaux with the luxury of spending each night in a different mountain hut. Our route will depend on the weather and snow conditions. In the evenings we shall relax in the comfort of the huts over meals made with local produce, discussing the day's journey.

Our expeditions in Greenland are more than simply dog-sledging or skiing experiences, since we travel and live with Inuit hunters and spend some time in their village, Ittoqqortoormiit (Scoresby Sund), where some of its inhabitants still make their living by hunting seals.





Cross-country skiing in Southern Liverpool Land

Liverpool Land is one of the most beautiful regions of Greenland. It was named by the whaler and explorer William Scoresby Jr. who wrote "... Nothing that I have seen equals it in bold grandeur and interesting character".

Very few people have visited this country in spring when the sea is frozen and the land is covered with snow. Our previous expeditions found this to be a superb area for ski touring due to the excellent weather and wonderful mountain and coastal scenery. The combination of 1,000-1,400m peaks and long valleys leading from glaciers to the sea-ice of deep fjords makes this expedition a fascinating prospect for cross-country skiers who are seeking a true wilderness experience without being over-extended. As a bonus we may see arctic hares, foxes and possibly a polar bear.

Dog sledging around Liverpool Land with Inuit hunters

For this adventure we'll leave the small hunting village of Ittoqqortoormiit (Scoresby Sund) located at the mouth of the largest fjord system in the world and head due north to explore Liverpool Land. Here we'll see sheer cliffs dropping down to meet the sea ice, deep valleys that beg to be explored and experience the silence of the High Arctic. This is a journey of contrasts – to the west lies Jameson Land, known for its low rolling hills and steady numbers of musk ox, while to the east lies Liverpool Land where it's mostly glaciated land breeding icebergs. We will pass through both areas using routes followed by generations of hunters. Along the trip we will see countless signs of snow hares, lemmings and polar foxes and we may be lucky enough to see polar bear. Our guides are local mushers with a wealth of knowledge about the area and how not just to survive the cold but to fully enjoy it. Two nights are spent in a local guest house in Ittoqqortoormiit and the rest sledging.

West Greenland recce with Lorraine Craig

The west coast of Greenland is not so well known to many of our Greenland clients. This recce trip, starting in Ilulissat (Jakobshavn) will incorporate boat trips among the spectacular grounded icebergs of the fjord, and easy walking in the third largest settlement in Greenland. A few days will be spent on Disko Island with a visit to the research station and walking among the basaltic lavas. After a boat trip to Port Victor, we will visit local view points to see the glacier front and, hopefully, calving icebergs. For those seeking a longer walk, a visit to the inland ice will be possible.

Scoresby Sund dog-sledging for women 40+

This new itinerary is especially for women aged forty and over! We start dog-sledging from Constable Point going north across Hurry Fjord as far as Kalkdalen Valley with beautiful views of mountains and glaciers on the way. Through the valley we travel to the east coast of Liverpool Land following the coastline towards Ittoqqortoormiit village. The scenery is breathtaking - high pointy mountains devoid of vegetation. On the way we might observe wildlife, such as seals, arctic foxes, little auks and perhaps even polar bear. Our hunters may take the chance to hunt seal for dog food. Spend the last three nights in a private house in Kap Tobin. From here we will hike out on short day trips and visit local hot springs. We'll have a full day in Ittoqqortoormiit so we can observe daily life in a typical Inuit community.

Hiking, wildlife and adventure

Fjords of Scoresby Sund, North East Greenland

The longest fjord system in the world, Scoresby Sund extends 350km inland and offers a perfect setting for exploring the region. Its enclosed waters are calm and navigable during the brief summer, which is remarkably warm with long periods of fine weather. This five-day hiking trip, escorted by local Greenlanders, makes use of a local boat to cover a wide area and takes us around the island of Milne Land which dominates inner Scoresby Sund. We will sail close to 1,000m high basalt cliffs interspersed with glaciers and visit the site of the winter quarters of Ryder's 1891-2 Danish Scientific Expedition on Danmark Island. By visiting Eskimo sites, some of which date back 4,500 years, we will

be able to envisage a life dominated by the need to survive by hunting. The boat covers distance rapidly, allowing us plenty of time to explore and hike on land, with longer hikes for the energetic. With 24-hour daylight we can choose to hike, boat or admire the view as we wish. Nights will be spent ashore in very comfortable campsites with a large mess tent for dining.

We'll be in complete contact with nature, combining trekking with kayaking and surrounded by an awe-inspiring landscape of blue-tinged icebergs and tundra. Kayak a spectacular navigation among ice, icebergs and glaciers and trek through the tundra in the wild Land of Mellem in southern Greenland. We hope to witness the Northern

Lights and see eagles, foxes and arctic hares, or even whales and seals. En route we will visit some Greenlandic Eskimo settlements.

RUSSIAN FAR EAST: KAMCHATKA

The Kamchatka Peninsula is the home of the Itelmen, Eveni and Koryaks, some of whom live by their traditional ways of hunting, fishing, reindeer herding and gathering wild plants. It is also home to the largest brown bear in Russia. The rivers teem with at least five species of spawning salmon and its rugged coastline accommodates thousands of seabirds, including tufted and horned puffins, guillemots, cormorants and harlequin ducks, as well as seals, sea lions and sea otters. In the valleys plants grow at an incredible rate during the summer due to the volcanically-warmed and minerally-enriched soil. On the tundra, cassiope and dwarf willows grow alongside the crimson rhododendron camtschaticum and Lapland buntings breed there. Valleys and hillsides are clothed in mixed woodlands with many wild flowers including fritillaria camtschatcensis, tiger lilies, yellow rhododendrons and wild roses. Kamchatka's birds range from migrating waders through black-billed capercaillie, rosefinches, roughlegged buzzards to the auks and Steller's sea eagle, which has a wingspan of three metres.



Kamchatka discoverer

See the 'greats' of Kamchatka for yourself in this easy-paced comprehensive trip which includes ethnic culture, sightseeing by helicopter, hiking inside an active volcano crater, bathing in hot springs and fishing in Avacha Bay. You will stay in a reindeer herder's yurt and enjoy close encounters with Kamchatka's superb wildlife. This journey is a unique opportunity for people of different ages to discover and explore the highlights of Kamchatka and learn about the lifestyles of the people who live here. Anyone can enjoy this trip as there's no need for strenuous physical activity.

There is nowhere in the world quite like Kamchatka, which was closed to both Russians and foreigners until 1990. It is an exquisite land of symmetrical snow-covered volcanoes, lava fields, hot springs, geysers, lush valleys, tundra, fast flowing rivers and rugged coastline. Due to its position on the 'Pacific Ring of Fire' it has more than 30 active volcanoes including Klyuchevskaya Sopka which has been emitting steam and smoke for at least 8,000 years.

Kamchatka in early summer 2011 – Sea mammals, birds, bears, whales, wild flowers and volcanoes

Early summer is the best time to see Kamchatka's migrating and breeding birds, land and sea mammals and wild flowers, before the mosquitoes become troublesome. We shall sail from Petropavlovsk on a small, refurbished ocean-going cutter and explore the south east coast of the peninsula. This is an extremely remote and seldom visited area, wild and spectacular with towering, snow-capped volcanoes including Viluchinsky and Mutnovsky. There are small islands and sea stacks which are the home of thousands of breeding seabirds including puffins and auks, and, on the high cliffs, the magnificent Steller's sea eagle breeds.

On the black volcanic sands we should see brown bears turning over the seaweed which has been washed up by winter storms to look for dead fish. Whilst sailing, we should see grey whales and dolphins including orcas. We shall go ashore to explore the lakes, cliffs, beaches and rivers and possibly a hot spring area. The ship-based part of the expedition is combined with a land visit to two mountainous areas of the peninsula. The ancient volcano, Vachkazhets, is scenically one of the most beautiful places in Kamchatka and we walk into its caldera and visit a beautiful waterfall. Mutnovsky, on the other hand, is still active and after climbing through a canyon past a glacier belching steam we enter the crater with its geysers, fumaroles, mud pools, spectacular rock formations and colours.

Kamchatka in late summer 2011 – Bears, volcanoes, native people, reindeer herders, autumn colours

This expedition takes place in late August, climatically one of the best times to travel and appreciate the spectacular scenery and autumn colours. In order to experience the richness of the region's flora, fauna and geology, we plan to visit as many habitats as possible including the central valley with the Kamchatka River, Tolbachik, Kzudach, Mutnovsky and Vachkazhets volcanoes, Kurilskoe Lake and the hot Khodukta River in the southern tundra. Kurilskoe Lake, part of a nature reserve, is one of the best places in the peninsula to see brown bears and Steller's sea eagles. Moving around by helicopter and truck we will enjoy a variety of experiences: watching bears feeding on the berries, salmon spawning, swimming in hot rivers and meeting the local people in the tiny settlement of Esso and staying overnight with the nomadic reindeer herders in the summer mountain camp. Weather permitting, we may be able to land in the crater of the Mutnovsky Volcano. As with our early summer trip, there will be plenty of time to follow your own interests. The trip ends in **Petropavlovsk** where we will learn its fascinating history and hear about life in Kamchatka today.

Dog-sledging

For centuries the Koryaks, Eveni and Itelmen people have used dog sledges in the wilderness and it is with them that you will travel. The area is rich in wildlife and you will see many tracks in the snow which your dog-sledge drivers will be able to identify. Your hosts receive very few visitors so you will feel privileged to be guests of their communities and learn to appreciate ways of life very different from your own.

This year we have two dog sledging expeditions. The first allows us to experience the traditional life and culture of the Eveni reindeer herders, as well as providing some exhilarating dog-sledging. Our second expedition will explore the volcanoes and hot springs of the Nalychevo National Park – close to Petropavlovsk. This is a wonderful area surrounded by at least six volcanoes, some of which are active and rise to more than 3,000 metres. We shall dog-sledge from hut to hut, enjoying the thermal springs along the route and marvelling at the awesome volcanic scenery.

We should say that these trips are for the hardy as it can be extremely cold! Participants can sit on the sledge and be driven by one of the dog handlers though the aim is to drive the dog team yourself.

Dog sledging with the reindeer herders and native people

Our route takes us over the pristine snow-covered mountain passes, high plateaux and valleys close to the volcano Ichinskiy in central Kamchatka. This area is the traditional home of some of the native peoples and we shall stay at an Eveni reindeer herder's winter camp and the wilderness home of a family of Koryak fishermen. Nights are spent in huts or yurts (large, heated tents). In the village of Esso we will visit the museum, bathe in a hot pool, meet the local people, learn about their culture and enjoy their songs and dances as well as the local produce of reindeer and salmon. Our visit may coincide with the Beringia dog sledge race and we may be able to watch some of it and meet the competitors.

Dog sledging to Nalycheva Valley

This exciting dog sledging expedition will take us to the centre of the Nalychevo National Park which lies to the north of Petropavlovsk. The park is in a magnificent setting surrounded by the volcanoes, Avachinsky, Koryaksky, Dzen-Dzur, Kozelsky, Aric, Aag, Zhupanovsky, Kupol and Vershinsky. Some of these are still active, with steam and smoke rising from their snow-covered summits. The valley has many fascinating geothermal areas. We shall travel by dog sledge and spend our days exploring and marvelling at the spectacular scenery and thermal activity. Our nights will be spent in comfortable huts and we shall have plenty of opportunities to enjoy bathing in the hot springs.

Arctic Russia covers a vast sweep of land from the Norwegian and Finnish borders eastwards across northern Siberia to the Chukotka and Kamchatka peninsulas. Much of it is tundra dotted with countless lakes and pools through which the vast north-flowing rivers wend their way to the Arctic Ocean. During the short intense summer these areas are the nesting sites for numerous birds, including the red-breasted goose, Siberian crane and Ross's gull. Wild flowers brighten the ground and musk oxen, bears, reindeer, lynx, wolverine, wolves and foxes roam.

Arcturus has organised many expeditions to the Russian Arctic. We shall visit first in winter and then return to the White Sea in June at the time of the 'white nights'. This is a period of continuous daylight, and we will use a small boat to transport us amongst the islands of the Solovetski archipelago.

Solovetski Islands and the White Sea

Situated in the White Sea, 150km south of the Arctic Circle, the Solovetski Islands are described as one of the 'jewels of Russia'. First settled by monks in the 1430s, the archipelago has six large and nearly 100 smaller islands, some of them covered by tundra and others with a groundcover of blueberry and crowberry. They abound with lakes, wildflowers and nesting birds and, in summer, beluga whales gather to calve in the shallow waters.

On the largest island, surrounded by enormous stone walls, stands the legendary 16th Century Solovetski Monastery, which in the 20th Century was one of the most feared and infamous prison camps, described by Solzhenitsyn in his book 'Gulag Archipelago'. Now that the monks have returned, it is possible to visit the beautiful cathedral, church, refectory and other buildings enclosed by the great 'kremlin' or fortification. There are over 170 architectural and archaeological

monuments on the islands, including 33 mysterious stone labyrinths dating back around 3,000 years. In some places, using small boats and wooden rakes, men still collect seaweed to be made into local products. Accommodation here is simple – family-owned comfortable small hotels with delicious food. It's an excellent place for walking in summer. Your journey is by train from **St. Petersburg** to **Kem** and then by boat across the **White Sea**.

Solovetski Islands in winter

This expedition provides a wonderful opportunity to visit the crisp, snowy landscapes of the north. After a day in Moscow, travel by train to Archangel on the banks of the icebound Dvina River, through a snow-covered rolling landscape of farms and silver birch wood, dotted with villages, hamlets and wooden churches. From there, fly to the Solovetski Islands for a seven-night stay in a homely and comfortable guesthouse. Days will be spent exploring the main island using local transport and snow-shoes. There are many tracks through the woods of 'dancing' birches leading to small lakes and the ice-bound coast. Depending on the ice conditions we may be able to walk out to some of the offshore islands and visit the monks in their isolated cells. Visit the Solovetski Monastery, Serniki Hill and the Botanic Gardens then enjoy fishing through the ice and, in the evenings, sitting around a wood fire and experiencing a Russian banya.

50 Years of Victory is a nuclear powered polar-class icebreaker and the largest fitted for passenger travel to the North Pole. She sails from Murmansk, Russia and has a steel ice belt enabling her to crush through ice up to 2.5 metres thick.

evocative name for the largest island of the Svalbard archipelago in the High Arctic, 1,300km from the North Pole. It has a fascinating history of arctic exploration and whaling. The scenery is dramatic - snowy peaks rise majestically through huge ice-caps, glaciers creep down valleys to the sea and sparkling ice walls enclose deep fjords. All this is surrounded by the glistening pack-ice as we walk along rocky shores. Since the banning of hunting in the 1970s, the populations of bears and walruses have dramatically increased and you are almost certain to see these magnificent creatures on your voyage.

East Greenland is one of the least visited places in the High Arctic since permission to land on the coast of the National Park is granted to very few operators. Our voyages to East Greenland cover the beautiful fjord system of Scoresby Sund and the scenically spectacular south east coast. Since they take place towards the end of the Arctic summer when the ice has receded, the autumn colours should brighten the tundra and there is an excellent possibility of seeing the Northern Lights.

We also sail to the Scottish Islands, Russia and the High Arctic.

ARCTIC NORWAY: SPITSBERGEN AND THE LOFOTEN ISLANDS

Sail North Spitsbergen

Embarking at Longyearbyen, Spitsbergen's administrative capital, we sail through scenic Isfjorden, setting a course for Alkhornet. We continue to Trygghamna to visit the remains of a 17th century English whaling station. Weather permitting we will go ashore at Fuglehuken, where the expedition of Willem Barentsz landed and Ny Alesund, the northernmost permanent settlement in the world and former starting point for many North Pole expeditions. Sailing from here to 14th July Glacier we take zodiacs to the breeding site for Brunnich's guillemots, little auks and puffins. Sailing north we visit Magdalenafjord, one of the most beautiful places in Spitsbergen, and Ytre Norskøya which was used as a lookout point for Dutch whalers. Raudfjord on the north coast offers good chances for spotting polar bears and belugas and, if sea-ice conditions allow, we may land on the northern side of Reindyrfla whose undulating tundra provides good grazing for reindeer. Our last visit before turning south is the remains of Smeerenburg which was the largest whaling settlement on Spitsbergen. If we



are able to make land on the return journey, fit walkers can opt to take the six-hour walk from Colesbukta to Longyearbyen.

In early summer the vegetation is surprisingly lush, especially below the bird cliffs where the ground is fertilised. By now migrating birds have returned to breed. The small Svalbard reindeer, arctic foxes and polar bears may be sighted on the tundra as well as walrus, seals and fin, humpback, bowhead and beluga whales in the waters

Sail North/around Spitsbergen

This 17-day itinerary aims to complete the voyage right around Spitsbergen. Early intineraries might cover the North Spitsbergen route depending on the condition of the pack ice. Later in the summer when the ice has cleared we are able to sail through the Hinlopen Strait and visit Nordaustlandet and Edgeøya. This route provides the greatest chance of seeing Greenland whales.

Sail South Spitsbergen – Aurora Borealis

This journey covers the southern part of Spitsbergen in October, just before the onset of winter, an ideal time for observing the splendid Aurora Borealis. Leaving Spitsbergen we set a course for Alkhornet at the mouth of the fjord whose cliffs are home to a large colony of kittiwakes. We continue to Trygghamna to visit the remains of the 17th century English whaling station before turning south and into the north side of Bellsund, where we make a walk to the cliffs of

Ingeborgfjellet and visit a glacier front at Fridtjofhamna. Journeying further south, we sail into the labyrinth of side fjords in Hornsund with good chances of seeing bearded seals and polar bears. Here we will also find spectacularly colourful geological formations. We will visit a Polish research station to discuss their scientific programmes before turning north once more. During nights with open skies we could experience temperatures of -10°C and new ice will be forming on the heads of the fjords.

Sail Lofoten Islands – Aurora Borealis

The Lofoten voyages take place in the autumn when the days are getting shorter in northern Norway but the daytime colours are beautiful. We can expect the first snow showers, and temperatures are sometimes just above freezing. At night we may be able to admire the Aurora Borealis. Embarking in the harbour at Lødingen we sail for Tysfjord. We plan to land at Musken, a Sami community and later visit the untouched wilderness area of Hellemobotn, close to the Swedish border

with small chances of seeing reindeer. We visit the Stone Age petroglyphs at Leiknes and climb the hill at Skarvberget looking for sea eagles. We will visit the lighthouse at Tranøy and Skrova, a small, rugged island and one of the few places in Norway where the locals still hunt minke whales. We end our voyage at Vestbygd before returning to Lødingen. The Lofoten voyages are very dependent on the weather which can be quite rough, so the itinerary is provisional.

Spitsbergen explorer - Land of the midnight sun

This 11- day active adventure begins and ends in **Longyearbyen** and aims, pack-ice conditions permitting, to circumnavigate the coastline of the largest island in the Spitsbergen group. We expect to sail magnificent fjords, cruise in Zodiacs past towering sea cliffs thronging with

bird life and encounter Arctic foxes, whales, polar bears and walrus in their natural habitat. Adventure options such as optional kayaking and camping are available on some departures.

North Spitsbergen

Our voyage heads north along the west coast of Spitsbergen and arrives by morning in Krossfjorden where we take to the zodiacs for an exhilarating journey along the sculpted front of the 14th of July Glacier to spot kittiwakes and Brünnich's guillemots, bearded seals and arctic foxes. Continuing, we sail to Ny Ålesund, the world's most northerly settlement, once a mining village and now a research centre. Close to the village is a breeding ground for barnacle geese, pink-

footed geese and arctic terns. Visitors interested in the history of Arctic exploration will want to walk to the anchoring mast used by Amundsen and Nobile in the airship Norge in 1926 and Nobile in the airship Italia in 1928 before their flights to the North Pole. Depending on the weather, we may go ashore on the tundra island of **Andøya** where many common eiders and pink-footed geese nest and sail into **Liefdefjorden**, cruising near the 5km long face of the impressive **Monaco**

Glacier. We then continue into the Hinlopen Strait, where, on the east side, we will attempt a landing at Nordaustlandet, home to reindeer, pink-footed geese, breeding ivory gulls and walruses. Our northernmost point will be Phippsøya at 81 degrees north, just 540 miles from the geographic North Pole. Polar bears inhabit this region, along with ivory gulls. We may sit for several hours in the pack ice, taking in our spectacular surroundings and seeing a Ross gull, before we turn south again.

North/around Spitsbergen

This itinerary covers the same early days as the North Spitsbergen voyage. From Phippsøya, however (pack ice conditions permitting), we then continue to Laagøya, a low island where a big herd of walrus tends to congregate. Heading into Hinlopen Strait we'll navigate the ice floes of Lomfjordshalvøya by zodiacs and explore the bird cliffs. Near Torrelneset we will explore the polar desert of Nordaustlandet next to the world's third largest ice cap, and in Freemansundet we plan to land at Sundneseton on the island of Barentsøya to visit an old trapper's hut. Later we head south to the west side of Edgeøya where we land on a beach littered with whale bones and tree trunks which have drifted here from Siberia. Our voyage ends with the side fjords of the spectacular Hornsund area of southern Spitsbergen. Our last landing is on Ahlstrandhalvøya where piles of beluga skeletons, the remains of 19th century slaughter

are still evident. If ice conditions are favourable we may sail around Nordaustlandet visiting **Kvitøya**, the place where the Swedish explorer Andree perished, instead of sailing back through the Hinlopen Strait.

GREENLAND, ICELAND AND SPITSBERGEN

North East Greenland

These adventurous voyages provide a rare opportunity to see the remote north-east coast of Greenland. In the past this required a camping and trekking expedition, but now you can experience the remarkable Arctic landscape from the comfort of a ship with expeditions ashore to visit Inuit sites and hunters' huts. On clear dark nights we might be able to see the Aurora Borealis.


At this time of year the pack-ice has retreated northwards. Between the high ice-cap of North East Greenland and the sea is a broad strip of low country that is free of snow in summer and covered in places with rich vegetation that supports much wildlife, from musk oxen to butterflies. The weather is usually calm and fine. Some of the people of Ittoqqortoormiit, the main settlement in the region, still make a living hunting polar bears, musk oxen, seals, whales and seabirds.

Crossing from Spitsbergen we keep watch for fin, humpback and minke whales and

approach East Greenland, landing at Myggebugten. We hope to encounter narwhal and should see musk oxen from the ship. Moving south to Scoresby Sund we land near a glacier and encounter huge icebergs before disembarking finally in Akureyri in north Iceland for the journey home.

Scoresby Sund – Aurora Borealis

Early autumn is the best time to explore the coast of East Greenland as the ice floes have usually dispersed and it is possible to enter the fjords. This is a voyage to a seldom-visited part of the coast. The days are still long, but temperatures can drop below freezing and the


scenery of stark ice contrasts with rich autumnal colours on the tundra. We visit a modern settlement and witness traditional Greenlandic culture. We should see birds moving south on migration, musk oxen, seals and possibly narwhals. On clear nights we may see the Aurora Borealis.

Jewels of Northeast Greenland

The Polar regions are still the most remote destinations on earth and a privilege to visit. Northeast Greenland is today the world's largest national park with shy and elusive wildlife - home to polar bear, walrus, Arctic hare and musk ox. Marine mammals include ringed, bearded, harp and hooded seals. Ice conditions

are unpredictable here, often creating new opportunities to explore. If the pack ice allows, we'll attempt to reach the rarely visited Kaiser Franz Josef Fjord, possibly sighting seals along the coast. The first voyage spends two days in Spitsbergen and ends in Iceland. The second operates in reverse.

THE ISLES OF SCILLY, SCOTTISH ISLANDS AND ARCTIC NORWAY

These voyages navigate among the most beautiful seabird islands in the North Atlantic. Virtually all the headlands at this time of the year are the sites of large seabird colonies. Dolphins, porpoises, seals, whales and even polar bears may be sighted from the ship and landings allow us to see reindeer and arctic fox.

Sailings are timed to coincide with a profusion of wild flowers and the sea cliffs of the **Scottish Islands** should look like rock gardens with the pink and white of sea pinks and sea campion. In addition to their natural history we will also focus on their human history and artefacts, such as old whaling stations.

Jan Mayen is a volcanic island of breathtaking beauty and mystique, dominated by Mt. Beerenberg. From the slopes of the 2,300m volcano, impressive glaciers spill into the sea. Until recently, the island was off-limits as it is a military base and was rarely visited by tourists, but, with permission from the Norwegian authorities, we hope to visit the weather station.

Islands on the edge

We start in **Dartmouth** for this unusual 15 day voyage, calling in at the **Isles of Scilly** and heading west along the **Dingle Peninsula** to see the gannet colony at the **Skelligs** and dramatic scenery of western Eire. The journey continues via the **Aran Islands**, **Inner Hebrides**, **Iona** and **Staffa** to **Mull**, **Skye** and **Rum**. At **St. Kilda** see skuas and fulmars and enjoy the dense bird populations of **Lewis**, the **Shetlands** and the **Orkneys**. You can disembark at **Dundee** or continue on via the fjords of Norway to **Spitsbergen**.

Islands, rich in bird and sea mammal life, and the final resting place of the famed Danish explorer Vitus Bering.

Birding the Kuril Islands

Commencing in Sakhalin, this voyage covers the full Kuril Island region with its stunning volcanoes and wide diversity of birds. The Kuril Island chain is made up of 32 islands that stretch between Russia and Japan across the Bering Sea, all formed by volcanoes that rise from the sea floor. The larger of the islands are inhabited, and most people make their living from the sea, as they have done for generations. The islands are unique and look like vast botanical gardens where

subtropical flora representatives neighbour with the flora of the polar latitudes. Here you will see gigantic herbs as well as bear, foxes and marine mammals such as seals, sea lions, fur seals and otters. One of the 'birding' highlights must be the Steller's sea eagle.

The Kamchatka Peninsula is a land of bays and snow-capped volcanoes whose alpine meadows and lowland forests support the greatest diversity of seabirds in Asia. The seas washing these

isolated coasts are among the most productive in the world and the area teems with birds and marine mammals, as do the remote **Commander Islands**, which we also visit.

Across the top of the world

Discover the north eastern part of Eurasia (Chukotka) in a way that has never been possible before. On this expedition we cruise across the Arctic Circle through the Bering Strait and into the Arctic Sea. It will be mid summer with 24 hour daylight and the ice will have retreated.

On shore you will meet the Chukchis, who

have learnt how to live in one of the harshest environments on the planet. We plan two days at Wrangel Island, a world class nature reserve, which is often referred to as the 'polar bear maternity ward'. This voyage also includes an overnight camping expedition to the tundra inland from Egvekinot to spend the night with traditional reindeer herders.

Journey to the Arctic - in Berings's wake

This new expedition is as unique as the First Kamchatka Expedition of 1725 - 1730 which was led by Danish explorer Commander Vitus Bering on orders from the Russian Tsar Peter the Great. His orders were to travel overland to Kamchatka (from St. Petersburg) and there build two ships and sail 'north by northeast... chart the coast and collect information'. It was an ambitious journey and a remarkable expedition.

Our expedition departs from Petropavlovsk-Kamchatskiy, a city named in honour of Bering's two ships built here for the second Kamchatka

(Great Northern) Expedition. From here we will sail north by north east to discover wildlife and wilderness that few people have seen or experienced because of the region's remoteness and the fact that it was a 'closed area' until the early 1990's. It is a land of extremes and a myriad of environments, including snow-capped active volcanoes, geothermal regions, vast forests, extensive tundra, uninhabited islands and rich oceans.

Every day we will search for the best wildlife experience, but we hope to find one bird in

THE HIGH ARCTIC - Icebreaker voyages

Franz Joseph Land expedition

Weyprecht and Payer discovered Franz Josef Land, an archipelago of 191 islands, in 1873. It became the scene of several expeditions which sometimes led to dramatic and tragic events. It was here that the historic meeting of Nansen and Jackson took place at Cape Flora on Northbrook Island in 1896. On Bell Island there is the hut built by Leigh Smith in 1881 and at Cape Norway on Jackson Island there are the remains of the shelter and memorial wooden post where Nansen and Johansen spent seven months during the winter of 1895-96. In 1899 two members of the Welle expedition wintered at Cape Heller on Wilczek Island and, in 1901, Alger Island was the winter refuge of the Baldwin expedition. We intend to visit

walrus rookeries on Stolichky and Appolonov Islands, the seabird colonies on Hooker Island and the majestic cliffs and ice-capped mountains of Champa Island. Polar bears, beluga whales and narwhals are often seen around these islands which were closed to foreigners from 1928 to 1990.



Most of our voyages depart from **Ushuaia** at the southern tip of South America and cross the **Drake Passage**, spending several days visiting the **South Shetland Islands** and the **Antarctic Peninsula**. The peninsula is a spectacular chain of mountains and glaciers and is the richest part of Antarctica for wildlife. The waters are sheltered by islands which makes for comfortable sailing and easy landings. Some of these voyages also visit **South Georgia** and the **Falkland Islands**.

South Georgia is a 100-mile long island with mountains and glaciers that equal the grandeur of Antarctica. There is also a green fringe of vegetation that supports a greater variety of wildlife, including the magnificent king penguin and wandering albatross, many smaller birds such as the endemic pintail and pipit, as well as teaming colonies of fur seals. For those interested in its history, many voyages visit the scene of Shackleton's epic crossing of the island.

The Falkland Islands are different again: an archipelago of large and small islands with an even more varied wildlife and relaxed lifestyle among the human inhabitants. More adventurous voyages head for the Ross Sea, sometimes called 'The Far Side of Antarctica' – on an icebreaker to visit emperor penguin colonies and Scott's and Shackleton's huts. Because some of the vessels are comparatively small, early booking is recommended.



The descriptions in the following itineraries are a guideline only, since the routes taken and the landings made will be dependent on ice and weather conditions. Classic Antarctic Peninsula

These voyages offer the best introduction to the White Continent and seeing as much as possible of the wildlife and scenery of the Antarctic Peninsula. Embark in Ushuaia and sail across the Drake Passage directly to 'high Antarctica' landing at Cuverville Island with its large colony of gentoo penguins and breeding brown skuas. A typical itinerary could include a continental landing at Neko Harbour and Paradise Bay and further south at Pleneau and Petermann Islands. There are good chances to see humpback and minke whales, adelie and chinstrap penguins and leopard and crabeater seals.

Antarctic Peninsula with South Shetlands

These itineraries are similar to the Classic Antarctic Peninsula but also include the South Shetland Islands where you visit the abandoned whaling station on Deception Island. The return voyage is through the Gerlache Strait, home to leopard seals and blue-eyed shags, followed by a visit to a research station. Landings are usually made twice a day so that all species of penguins, seals and other wildlife will be seen; some landings visit historic sites and operational bases while zodiac cruises offer an exciting alternative to landings.

FROM SOUTH TO NORTH

Atlantic Odyssey

As the ships are used for voyages in both polar regions, each year the vessels are repositioned from the Southern Atlantic Ocean to the Arctic region. This gives the opportunity for this fantastic Atlantic Odyssey which has been called the 'finest pelagic bird-cruise' in the world. Apart from observing many bird species, you will be able to witness the northern bird migration. This epic voyage starts from Ushuaia and heads south to the Antarctic Peninsula in search of albatross, petrels and other southern species. Then we turn north to the South Orkneys and on to South Georgia for king penguins, macaroni penguins and wandering albatross before continuing deeper into the Atlantic to visit the Tristan da Cunha archipelago. Here the ship may be able to land at Inaccessible Island to see the endemic inaccessible rail. There are zodiac

cruises close to **Gough Island** for Gough moorhen and Gough bunting before sailing on north to **St. Helena**, where Napoleon lived in exile, and **Ascension Island** with its colony of over a million sooty terns. Your voyage ends in the **Cape Verde Islands** with its spectacular volcanic scenery, so different from the ice of the Southern Ocean.

Pelagic West Africa

This new itinerary starts in the Cape Verdes whose isolation has resulted in a number of endemic species including the Raso lark and Cape Verde swift, warbler and sparrow. Darwin landed here in 1832. Heading north we also hope for chances to see shortfinned pilot whale, bottlenose dolphin and perhaps sperm whale. Our target at

Raso and Branco Islands will be the red-billed tropicbird. Cruising north off Mauritania and Western Sahara we look out for all the skua species and in the Canary Islands we plan evening zodiac cruises to see thousands of shearwaters and petrols. The voyage ends in Madeira where we visit the Desertas Islands, now a nature reserve.
